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WMOA Chairman's Report December

As you will be aware the region has lost two of its membership.

By the mid-sixties, Toby Norris was already something of an orienteering icon. Based in the South East at that time, Toby became a member of the Mole Valley Map & Foot Racing Society. Later Toby moved up here to join the staff at Aston University and became a member of the City of Birmingham Club. Toby was founder member of the national 'Old Codgers' O Club, a dining society which meets twice a year - the JK and again at the UK Summer multi-day events.

We also lost John Bennison who I first met in the 1970s when he was providing valuable support to the WMOA as Schools Liaison Officer. John, at that time, was also doing great things with his Tividale School Orienteering Club. Upon leaving teaching, John became a whiz with the new technology, and must have advised and/or acted as trouble-shooter for many in the region when their personal computer needed some TLC. I could only admire when any Word document of John's came my way. He had the knack of understanding and using every formatting feature that Microsoft had put in the product. John's WMOA handbook is legendary, each edition containing more and more useful information that included who was who in (and surrounding) the region with every useful name and associated telephone number (and later email address) that you needed. John was a Grade A Controller, controlling a recent CompassSport Cup Final in the Forest of Dean. It seemed that each year John would join a different Club within the WMOA. In this way John could build up a working knowledge of good practice invented by each club and thus he kept all of us on the straight and narrow.

A celebration of John's life was held in the afternoon of New Year's Day. Carol Sparke, assisted by Ruth Lockley and family, had put together a vast array of just part of John's 'O' archives. Several spoke of how John had helped them over the years. I can only fully support the suggestion that has been made to name one of the Region's annual events in

memory of John. Following further discussion within the membership, a proposal will be brought to the March Committee meeting for consideration.

I can report that Andy Yeates (WCH) has been upgraded to a Grade A Controller. Ernie Williams, BOF's Major Officials Officer has provided a glowing report of Andy's achievements within the events that he has been involved with. Andy's appointment is subject to attending an Events Safety Course. Such a course will be taking place one evening early in March. The course is suitable for those involved with Level D events upwards. Further details will be available early in January. Please contact me if you would like to take part.

The final 2014 League events have been put on by Wrekin and Walton Chasers. The latter being the WMOA Championships congratulations to our 2014 Champions. We now look forward to a very full programme of League events for 2015. In addition, on 15 February, Walton Chasers are staging the Midlands Championships on Cannock Chase. With Springtime in Shropshire in May also to look forward to, may I wish you a happy new year of orienteering.

Minutes of WMOA meeting on 8 December 2014, Great Barr Hotel

- 1. Apologies: M. Elkington, D. Jacks, B. Morgan, R. Postlethwaite.
- 2. Declarations of Interest: None.
- 3. The Minutes of previous meeting were accepted as a true record.
- 4. Matters Arising: None.

5. Correspondence:

Details of a BOF Coaching Conference to be held 24/25 January had been circulated - to be held in Swindon. Booking is through Fabian 4. This had been forwarded to clubs.

The latest 'Mike's e news' had been forwarded on.

6. Chairman's Report:

R. Brandon opened his report with his personal memories of both Toby Norris and John Bennison, both of whom had recently passed away. John's life and contribution to orienteering were set to be celebrated at the forthcoming New Year's Day event and suggestions had been put forward for a Regional event to bear his name.

A. Yeates (WCH) had been proposed as a Grade A Controller pending completion of an Event Safety Course.

The final events of the 2014 League had taken place with events put on by WRE and WCH, the latter event had also included the West Midlands Championships; there was a new season to look forward to, starting with the Laurie Bradley New Year's Day Score event.

There was some discussion about naming an event after J. Bennison or other options for ensuring that his contribution to orienteering will be remembered. It was felt that the number of people present was only a small proportion of the West Midlands membership and that this should be discussed at the Laurie Bradley event where the views of many more people could be heard and taken into consideration.

7. Treasurer's Report:

The level of levy receipts was modest. B. McGowan had heard nothing about the final accounts from the British Sprint and Middle Championships (Both POTOC and WCH reported that they would make a donation of £200 from these events once any monies had been transferred to them from BOF). It was hoped that levies received from 2015 events would be in the region of £3000. There is currently £1552 in the bank and the Junior Squad have £200 remaining.

The costs relating to the hire of the meeting room at £55 per meeting were reviewed. When combined with mileage for officials to attend the meetings (excluding the AGM), total costs per annum are about £600. It was felt that the room hire was good value and the facilities were very good and secure. It was also very central and easy to reach and it was recognised that some committee members travelled a long way to attend meetings. The possibility of meeting in members' houses was raised although it was felt that this did not create a professional feel. Also meeting after an event would not be successful,due to waiting around in the cold for others to finish their runs. It was agreed to continue the current arrangements.

8. Fixtures:

West Midlands Urban League

A. Williams had reviewed the attendance at the four events and there had been little travelling by members to other club's events. The 2014 League scores are all updated and can be found on the Nopesport platform.

A. Williams and R. Postlethwaite to produce certificates for the class winners of the 2014 League.

The programme of events for 2015, at present, is Lichfield (WCH), Ludlow (Wrekin), Redditch (HOC) and possibly Sutton College (COBOC). The latter is a Sprint event using a 1:2500 map and course alignment needs to be resolved. L. Phillips (OD) had proposed a five course structure for the Warwick University event planned by OD as being more appropriate to the numbers of participants.

WM League 2015

The clubs had put forward 14 events which was too many. After some discussion it was decided to ask HOC to choose three of their five proposed events. This would still leave 12 events.

It was noted that the weekend of 7/8 February had events from both HOC and WRE and was also clashing with the Southern Championships which was a selection race.

A. Williams to check with L. Ross to see if the software for the League points/ placings will work with 12 events rather than 10.

JIRC2015: preparation is progressing.

BOC 2016 Brown Clee: It is believed that Controllers have been appointed.

JK 2018: David Pal (WOA) had been quite open to the proposal for WMOA to further explore the possibility of staging this event in Wales. A co-ordinator is needed. We need to explore areas and see what the permissions situation is like. It was felt that holding this event in Wales might attract a larger attendance than if it was held in the West Midlands.

Peter Palmer Relays: This event was clashing with The British Schools Orienteering event, in terms of both events wanting to use Sutton Park in 2016 which was not feasible. It has been decided that the area would be used for the British Schools Championships in 2016 and the Peter Palmer Relays in 2017. The requirements for an area for the 2016 Peter Palmer Relays had been referred back to M. Cope for resolution.

9. West Midlander:

The following update had been received from R Postlethwaite: "The last issue was pleasing because I had a lot of articles by other people. I have only had positive comments so I will try to maintain the standard for future issues. For the next issue could someone please send me a list of the West Midlands Champions? The next issue will be out about New Year after I've received the minutes."

(It was noted that the list of West Midlands Champions can be found on the WCH website.)

10. Development:

Mapping Training - there was no progress to report, but interest had been shown by several members of WRE, focussing on ability to make small updates to maps.

Event Safety and Welfare Course - this was being focussed around the event officials for BOC 2016. Chris Phillips from EMOA has agreed to put this on early in March if there is sufficient demand (6-12), three participants from OD and one from WCH have been identified. It is likely to be held in Coventry. B. McGowan said WMOA could subsidise this

and R. Brandon stated that this might well be funded through BOC 2016, which was driving the requirement. More details will be circulated in the New Year once dates are confirmed.

Local Event Officials Courses: Requests for an Organiser's course have come from both WRE and WCH. B. McGowan confirmed that funding would be available to support this. There had been one request for a Controller's course so this would be considered at a later date. Any further interest in these courses to be fed back to R. Brandon, H. Morgan or D.Kingsbury.

R. Postlethwaite to include a note in West Midlander asking for those who require Official's courses to contact one of the WMOA committee as above.

11. Events and Competitions Committee

Minutes from the ECC are to be sent to Secretaries of the Regional Associations in an effort to increase the level of communication and awareness of this committee's work.

For future BOF events the Major Events agreement will only be signed between BOF and Regions, not individual clubs.

Where Safety Officers need to be appointed it is important for them to have attended the relevant workshops.

It was noted that 3 members of WCH had been appointed as Controllers for major events in the coming years.

The Midlands Championships is a Level A event. East Anglia can only offer Level B events at present, otherwise they have difficulty with embargoed areas. Thus this competition will alternate between EMOA and WMOA until such time that EAOA can offer an area compatible with a Level A event requirements. It has been noted that Level A events don't have commentary, which is generally required.

The ECC are aware that under 16s are running on roads unaccompanied in Urban events, which is contrary to BOF Rules and invalidates event insurance. It was made very clear that Organisers and Planners of Urban events will be held to account personally for any incidents that might arise. The same applies to evening Street events. Applying the under 16 rule is recognised to be difficult, especially for those with birthdays in their 16th year, as they register as M/W 16, whilst aged 15. It is recommended that Junior registrations are dealt with by a single person so that they have more time to query ages and courses and ensure that youngsters run an appropriate course or are accompanied. If a suitable course for youngsters is not available this should be clear in the flyers.

12. West Midlands Junior Squad September 2014 to December 2014 (Mel Elkington & Sarah Dredge)

Junior Inter Regionals in NWOA took place on September 27/28 weekend. The team consisted of Aimee Morse, Gemma Cairns-Smith, Rhiannon Cope, Heather Craig, Ellie Bales, Stephen Elkington, Nathan Lawson, Harrison McCartney, Will Heaton, Alfie Bullus, Ewan Lloyd. They were very impressive in both in their behaviour and the way they tackled some very challenging courses. The courses are at the top end of the range of difficulty for the colour.

Both Iain Embrey and Mel attended the Junior Regional Orienteering Squads AGM on behalf of the West Midlands Junior Squad in Hathersage on the 8 November 2014. The Summer tours have now been announced and details can be found on the Junior Regional Squad website: <u>www.jros.org.uk</u>. Both Jackie Newton and Mike Hamilton attended part of this meeting to explain how the GB Talent Squads, etc. will work in future.

The West Midlander

Matt Hartland has just been selected for World Schools in Turkey in April 2015, so please support him if he does any fundraising for it.

The annual trip to Hawkshead took place on the 28/29/30 November for Matt Hartland, Gemma Cairns-Smith, Heather Rogers, Heather Craig, Holly Hughes and Ellie Bales. The coaches were Iain Embrey, Mel Elkington, Matt Elkington and Nathan Lawson. This was, yet again, an outstanding weekend of training at TD5 level. Those that attended benefitted hugely. They trained on Bishops Wood and Holme Fell on the Saturday followed by Dale Park on the Sunday.

The Squad currently has three members that are part of the GB Talent Squad: Julie Emmerson, Harrison McCartney and Nathan Lawson.

In 2015 OD have offered the Junior Squad training for the JK Sprint at Warwick University on Saturday 28 March 2015.

13. Publicity Suggestion:

Adrian Bailey had proposed an email messaging system, going out weekly, to get information directly to orienteers, e.g. results of the previous week's events and details about the event the following week. This was prompted by disappointing turnouts for smaller events and recognising that not all orienteers are keen enough to keep an eye out for forthcoming events.

This was discussed and there was some positive support for this suggestion. Feedback from HOC felt that this might be an intrusion to some members given there are multiple channels of communication already in use by them. OD reported that they send out emails advertising their local events, which is essentially one line with a link, so is very quick to read or delete. This is successful for them but the point was made that this is used for local events, their members would not necessarily be interested in WRE Summer evening events. POTOC reported that they use Facebook as a means of communication.

So, it seemed that those clubs using regular updates via electronic media were having success by targeting local events and thus it is appropriate for such initiatives to be club driven.

14. Email tree

A. Williams had not had the opportunity to speak to J. Bennison so our position in relation to accessing the WMOA domain and email tree was not known. Nor is it known how the domain names can be updated e.g. <u>secretary @wmoa.org</u>. B. McGowan stated that he is not aware of any charges for <u>wmoa.org</u>. It was suggested that C. Sparke or R. Lockley be contacted to see if they can assist.

In terms of **data protection** issues, WMOA do not keep a database from which personal data may be extracted so we have no compliance requirements. We do have a small number of WMOA email addresses for conducting WMOA business and need to safeguard individuals' email addresses where used e.g. use of Bcc. The WMOA email tree is believed to be a list of named contacts in clubs, who then circulate the information on to the club members. Thus there was no requirement for WMOA itself to register for data protection purposes. It is the clubs who have a defined obligation to control data.

J. Woodall was asked to seek BOF advice for the clubs relating to any data protection issues surrounding extracts of the BOF database that they might hold, or use.

15. AOB

H. Morgan reported that the West Midlands Shield had been donated by POTOC 25 years ago and that the last space for engraving would be taken this year. Suggestions were sought about how to record next year's winner. From discussion it seemed that general practice was to move the older shields to the back, so leaving space for new ones on the front.

R. Collins had noted that the UK League fixtures listed in the last edition of Focus were all in the North or South or Ireland, but nothing in the Midlands, yet the principle was for these events to be country wide. B. Elkington responded that they needed to be Level A or B events and it was for the organising clubs to submit their events for consideration to be included in the League but this process is not yet being fully followed. The ECC put in the Level A events and then look for groupings e.g. if there is an Urban event in the Midlands on a given weekend they would ask clubs to nominate a second event for inclusion in the UK League, etc. However, WMOA clubs tend not to stage many Level B events. There had been little co-ordination for the 2015 League so M. Cope had selected a range of events from the fixtures list. With fixtures being confirmed for Level A events into 2017 and beyond, it is now easy for clubs to see where there are gaps alongside a Level A event and to plan accordingly.

16. Next meeting - 9 March 2015.

Further meeting dates for 2015 are:

8 June, 14 September, 14 December; and the AGM will be on 12 October.

Toby Norris (COBOC) 18 April 1937 - 15 October 2014



It is with great sadness that we report the passing of Toby on Wednesday afternoon 15 October 2014 at home peacefully. During 2014 he had become increasingly breathless and despite entering the 2014 Swiss Multi day event felt the need to withdraw after just one day.

Toby was very well known in the early days of English and British Orienteering from around early 1965 when working at the CEGB Electrical Power Systems Laboratories (CERL) in Leatherhead. He became Professor of Electrical Power Systems at Aston University, Birmingham with the privatisation of the electrical industry and was subsequently given the title of 'Emeritus Professor' on reaching retirement.

He was a founder member in 1966 of the Mole Valley Map & Compass Foot Racing Society (Mole Valley) in Surrey when he became the first Clerk (Hon Sec). The extended name came about, apparently, due to the company providing personal insurance not covering 'racing except on foot', so Toby wished to ensure that there was no doubt that the club he raced for raced on foot.

Being involved with the foundation of Mole Valley and creating something just a little different was so typical of Toby. I remember one of his early local events where he labelled one control as 'Site of Neolithic Find'. In practice this was a mark on the OS map in the middle of an open field. To the orienteer there was nothing present except the kite. One will realise that we still used black & white photo copies of the OS in those days.

After a enjoying an evening meal at his bachelor pad in Coldharbour one day I regretted accepting his unusual tea,for after it I could just not get to sleep that night!!

Toby was quick to accept the opportunity to try orienteering in other countries. We both went to the Euromeet in 1966 organised by Byron Lagerfelt of Swedish Orienteering. As newcomers we were duly amazed by the forests, the superb accommodation and the TV coverage. Toby was stopped mid course and asked how he was finding the event. He responded "Splendid but aren't these flies dreadful!" Of course this was all televised so we could all enjoy Toby at his best. During the same trip we were relaxing and swimming at a Lake or inlet and there was Toby in Victorian Bathing Trunks with straw boater aloft wading across the water clothes under arm.

He was a member then of the 1966 English team to compete in the first World Championships at Fiskars, Finland. We had taken a team of 10 men for, as we thought. 6 would compete in the Individual and the other 4 in the Relay. Of course we all know now that this was not in the rules but after a very strong protest they did permit the 4 to compete noncompetitively in the Relay. In practice neither Toby nor I actually went into the forest as the team was timed out; something that we corrected at WOC 1976.

Toby's elder brother Tom and his wife Patricia were also heavily involved in those early days. Sadly Tom is not enjoying the best of health these days. However Patricia Norris became the first person to receive remuneration for acting as Secretary to the English Orienteering Association. I remember Tom saying that his younger brother was a confirmed bachelor and would never get married. Well, fortunately, he was proved wrong when Toby met Joan. I knew otherwise and was very pleased to be invited to call a Barn Dance at their wedding celebrations August 1978 at the 'Reading Rooms' in Westcott, Dorking.

In 1975 Toby was elected as Vice Chairman of the Federation and then Chairman of the Federation in 1978. That year the BOF AGM was held in St Andrews, Scotland, prior to the BOC in Tentsmuir on the Sunday. The two of us decided to be different and to arrive by bicycle having taken the train to Leuchars Junction from Kings Cross. As the new Chairman he enthusiastically encourage everyone to build upon the doubling of the membership that occurred in his tenure. In recent years Tony was a staunch supporter of the Orienteering Foundation by encouraging BOF members to help finance the overseas trips for the top Juniors.

In 2004 along with the late John Colls they formed an Orienteering Diners Club call the 'O-Codgers'. It first met on 11 March 2004 during the 2004 Lakes JK at 'The Wheatsheaf' in Brigsteer. Since that first meeting the group has met at most JKs and the Summer Multiday events with Toby as Chairman and Joan as Treasurer. They later stood down leaving Mike Elliot in charge. Toby was keen to give long-standing orienteers chances to meet socially and had suggested that 25 years be the minimum experience until I pointed out to him that this would include my children Peter and Jenny (Peel). The criterion was raised to 30 years. In practice such a bar has not really been enforced as friends and families have also joined. He will be remembered as the epitome of the English Gentlemen, a little eccentric but thoroughly likeable. Our thoughts go out to his wife Joan and children Calah, Robert and Emily all of whom were with him at the end.

John Bennison (WRE) 17th July 1944 - 17th November 2014

John Bennison has very sadly lost his 9 month battle with stomach cancer. He bore his illness stoically, privately and with tremendous strength of character. He decided to fight back with good diet and positive thinking. John was a life long vegetarian and teetotal and, on diagnosis, he started an in depth analysis of foods that were good for cancer. Given what he considered an appallingly bad diet sheet he crossed deleted 90% of it and handed it back to the hospital dietician with his research of what was suitable for a vegetarian.

Born in Wickham, Hampshire, the family spent time moving between England and South Africa/Southern Rhodesia (now Zimbabwe) until they settled in Sutton Coldfield in 1956; John's father having been in the Royal Navy. John went to Bishop Vessey Grammar School where he excelled at high jump but it was not until his final years that he seemed to take up running. He was also a member of the school's philatelic society and maintained that interest in collecting stamps in his later years.

John graduated in 1966 from Liverpool University (Mathematics) and then did a PGCE. He retained his links with the University as an elected Convocation member of the University Court (a representative and consultative body used to keep the wider community informed of the University's work) and served on Court from 1968 to 2013.

John taught Maths at Waterloo Grammar School near Liverpool (1967-72), organised the school cross-country team and ran himself for Waterloo Harriers. John played baseball in the Summer and started orienteering at Thurstaston Common on the Wirral on 9 May 1971; an event to which he took a coach party from his school. That party included Graham Nilson (a founding member of MEROC, now with DEE) and Andy Taylor, who now does his orienteering in New Zealand. It was during this period that John met Dick Keighley (WIM) and John Burrows (KERNO) (JSB) who were also teachers at the school. It was JSB who was responsible for introducing JB to orienteering. In Oct 1968 JSB says that



when teaching at Kirby (just outside Liverpool) he went on a weekend course for teachers staged in the Lake District by Gerry Charnley to introduce orienteering. JSB immediately took the sport up. In Sept 1970 JSB moved schools and joined JB and Dick at Waterloo Grammar School. They both learnt of the sport from JSB at Waterloo Grammar School.

John did mountain leadership courses and moved to be deputy head of Maths at Tividale Comprehensive School in the West Midlands (1972-76). He introduced orienteering at this school and took groups to Arran in the Summer holidays.

In 1972 undertook a CSE in Computer Science and in 1976 he left teaching to pursue a career in IT. He had a year as a freelance programmer before being appointed as Programming Manager and Lecturer in Computer Science at Warley College of Technology in Sandwell. Between 1982 and 1990, John was in a partnership called 'ABM computers' on the Warwick Road, Tysley. The business was an Apple dealer and had its highs but some terrible lows as well. At the end of 1989, John bought out his partner and started John Bennison Computer Services. He extended from Apple support into Windows support, the latter being more profitable as Windows failed so often to deliver. Only in the past few years did he reduce his workload and start calling himself 'retired'.

John had an eve for detail and an ability to read, digest and summarise that most of us can but envy. He produced 'O' Club yearbooks, Regional hand books, Controllers' and Planners' check lists and detailed event safety briefings. He was an experienced Grade 1 Planner and Controller and he taught on the Major Event Officials courses. He also organised and presented WMOA courses for Grade 2 and 3 Planners, Controllers and Organisers and for those needing to programme or use the SI kit. Whilst John did organise events; he excelled at planning and controlling. He was an early supporter and enthusiast for 'Trail-O' and the day that he died, Dick Keighley (WIM) and Pat McLeod (NGOC) had discussed asking John to control the British 'Trail-O' Champs at BOC 2015. For the WMOA John served as the Co-ordinator of Controllers, email tree manager and the Data Protection/Privacy officer for many years. His last controlling activity was the Compass Sport Cup Final on Moseley Hill, Forest of Dean, in October 2013.

John sought to contribute to BOF and was short listed for the post of Assistant Secretary General in 1999 and then again for the post of Executive Officer Administration in 2004. As a teacher, John was interested in Junior development. He worked with Peter Palmer (WCH) on the development of the WM Schools' OA and trained as an orienteer instructor (the original BOF Coaching qualification). In 1992 John organised the HOC Juniors, led by Amy Fauset in running the first orienteering event at Woodgate Valley on a map produced by Chris Shaw (BUOC). He gave the Juniors all the training they needed for managing the event and he was the only adult helping at the event. John

also organised a number of Junior tours in the UK and abroad. Mapping was something that John also undertook including training others in the use of OCAD, PICOVER and Condes. His last mapping project was Hilltop and Manwood in 2013.

John competed in many KIMM events starting, I believe, in 1972 and he was still competing as late as 1995. He ran the A class with Wendy Dodds (BUOC) for 5 of these events and his best result was as the first mixed pair on the A course in the Cheviots KIMM in 1974.

Wendy noted, "I have been reminiscing about the 1974 KIMM in the Cheviots with John as it was returning there 40 years on in 2014, though it had been there in 1988 and 2002 also. That was the night you filled the pan with water so we would not have to get out of the tent in the morning. We thought it had tipped over in the night as we couldn't see any water in it the morning till we realised it had frozen solid! At least in 2014's OMM the pan of water did not freeze on Saturday night but it was very windy."

Having only started orienteering in 1971, it seems amazing that John controlled the KIMM on Arran in 1980. As well as controlling, John was responsible for introducing computers to this event for entries and results and I believe he did the programming for the event himself. Although the results were significantly delayed in their appearance, he nevertheless established the value of using computers for such events.

John was introduced to Nordic skiing by his good friend Alan Mason who was the Manager of the BOF Squad between 1975 and 1981. With little snow in the UK, it was to Norway that they went. John took part in a number of KIMM ski events in Norway (1979 and 1980) and organised one himself too.

As well as skiing, John holidayed in Norway, including a HOC Junior tour. He stayed at Rod Tuck's lodge at Kvitavatn and also went to the Midnight Sun orienteering races in northern Norway. John had a long standing love for Norway and had hoped to move there permanently when his family commitments permitted.

Junior European Cup (JEC) October 2014

This year Great Britain took a full team to the Junior European Cup which was held in Belgium. GB don't usually take a team because it is a weird time of year for racing (it does not sit well with most orienteers' annualised training plans) so it is mainly an opportunity for experience. On the Friday we did a model training event in the morning in preparation for both the Long and the Relay. The terrain was lovely, runnable, forested sand dunes. In the evening the Sprint race took place in the town of Lommel. It was fairly straightforward but I didn't have the speed to compete with the top runners. I was running up to W20 because there were more W18s than 20s in the GB team, and maybe I would have had a better result in the W18 class.

The next day was the Long race. The terrain was fairly flat and runnable so the courses were very long: 10.2km straight-line for the W20s; rather less for the W18s! It was also very hot and there were some large areas of sand that were very hard to run through. Altogether it was a very tough race. I was amongst the many who made silly mistakes in the final loop through exhaustion. Another average result but lots of positives to take away. The final race was the Relay (18s and 20s mixed). I ran 2nd leg and went out in 6th

place (but 1 team had mis-punched so we were actually 5th), about 30 seconds behind 4th/5th and 2 minutes behind the top 3 with plenty more right on my tail. I led a small group for the first 3 controls and then we caught some runners in front and I settled into the pack before leading the whole pack for a few more controls. It is very satisfying to lead a pack of Scandinavians! It was very hard to tell what was going on as there were lots of people around and lots of 'gaffling'. After the spectator control the pack split slightly on 'gaffles' and my half got ahead. The girls in front had a small miss at the second to last control so I was 1st into it! I handed over 2nd in the pack and 3rd overall - there was a Swedish team with a big lead. My last leg then did a great job to bring us home in 5th, only being beaten by one team each from Sweden, Norway, Denmark and Switzerland (countries can have up to 4 teams). It was such a fun area for a relay, a really exciting race and an amazing result! It was a mixed weekend but at this point I hadn't even started my Winter training so I wasn't expecting much and it is more valuable international experience.

Orienteering from a Non-Orienteering Mum's Perspective

On a cold, wet and muddy Saturday in November 2 years ago, I was on the sidelines at a school cross country race. Watching Felix and Oliver sprint towards the finish line their head teacher mentioned that she thought orienteering might be a sport for them both to consider. She said to me: "there's a local club, it's got a funny name which I can't remember, 'Google' it and go along."

Orienteering? I didn't know anything about orienteering apart from a vague recollection of unsuccessfully running through a wood looking for numbered posts during a PE lesson many years ago. However, always up for a new challenge and offering my family new experiences, I took the head's advice and 'Googled'. Octavian Droobers appeared on the screen and, as fate would have it, their next event was just 2 miles up the road at Abbey Fields!

We arrived on the said day, registered and were made to feel so welcome. Felix was the only one game for the course that day and after we'd waved him off, the rest of us headed to the park, not really sure what time he would arrive back - 1 hour? 2 hours? Or was this an all day event? I really wasn't sure!

Within 15 minutes I could see him heading towards me... this couldn't be a good sign... I looked for signs of distress or panic on his face.... all I could see was a large grin... What would possibly be wrong, why was he back so early? He thrust a 'shopping list' type print out into my hands- 13 minutes 11, I found all the controls! Can I do it again? he gasped breathlessly. In the weeks that followed, we slowly learnt the ropes and one by one all four of my children 'got bitten by the orienteering bug.' And what an infectious bug it is....

We have seen breath- taking parts of the Midlands and travelled as far as the Scottish Borders. Places we would never have had the opportunity to visit, never mind compete at. Christmas and birthday lists are now full of orienteering kit essentials, weekends are planned around events or training sessions and tactics are discussed in the car on the way. The chat on the route home tends to be a dissection of the course and how they would run it differently next time. I believe that there is a plot amongst the four of them to persuade us to take them away to the Lakes for Easter next year!! We most probably will oblige because even as non-orienteers, we enjoy it all too. I still can't quite believe that on New Year's Day, I found myself running through knee deep puddles, in the pouring rain, motivating a 9 year old at a score event after only 3 hours sleep!

The freedom and independence that orienteering offers Felix, Oliver, Tabitha and Florence has been so good for them to develop skills that support other parts of their lives. They also love being part of such a close knit, supportive, friendly, competitive team who take an interest in their performance and encourage them along the way.

A friend asked me why I let my children run off into the woods on their own with only a compass and a map for company. Was I not worried about their safety? Momentarily, I felt like the most negligent mother on this planetwhat was I doing? However, the rational side of me kicked in and we have always gone home with the same number of children that we started with and isn't that what a whistle is for?

Over the last couple of years we have had our fair share of disappointment, mis-punches and map frustration but we have also had plenty of 'highs' with sheer exhilaration, podium places, team participation and successful finishes.

Orienteering and Octavian Droobers have become a wonderful, enriching part of our lives and you never know, one day Philip and I might actually be brave enough to try an Orange!
