



Minutes of WMOA Committee Meeting 10 September 2018 Great Barr Hotel

1. Present: B. Elkington, I. Gamlen, D. Kingsbury, R. Lewis, B. Morgan, H. Morgan,

R. Postlethwaite, M. White, A. Williams.

- 2. Apologies: R. Collins, R. Dredge, M. Elkington, J. Howell, K. Strain.
- 3. **Matters Arising:** In relation to the discussion about the Forward Plan, the minutes state that WMOA committee would appoint the event officials. This should read 'approve'. It was confirmed that the process should be to approach the Fixtures Secretary at the point when the event officials are known.
- 4. Acceptance of Minutes: The minutes were accepted as a true record.
- 5. Declarations of Interest: None.

6. Correspondence (not covered elsewhere on the Agenda):

Notification from BOF about the Club and Association Conference to be held in Birmingham on 20 October 2018 - the agenda has not yet been published. WMOA committee members wishing to represent the region to notify Delia Kingsbury for registration.

British Orienteering Association return to be completed after the AGM.

Contact from Walsall Council wishing to revive some tired Permanent Orienteering Courses - put in touch with Barry McGowan.

Request to review the entry on Dudley Community Library website.

Update from BOF about safeguarding - forwarded to all WMOA committee members.

A request for support had been received from Ellie Bales (POTOC) to attend JROS and a donation had been made.

7. Chairman's Report:

There was no report. The Vice-Chairman noted that there had been some successes from the region at the recent British Sprint and Middle Championships and runners were congratulated.

8. Treasurer's Report:

The bank balance currently contains the surplus from JK2018 with payments to clubs due to be made shortly, with the split 1/10 to each organising club (including Royal Signals) and 3/10 to WMOA as per the agreement. The JK surplus is a bonus, but those who were long serving on the committee cautioned for wise planning on its use, given that the financial health of WMOA had seen marked fluctuations in recent years.

Income from general event levy is higher than budgeted and slightly more had been paid to EOC than had been budgeted. Looking forward to next year the region has SinS and the Midland Championships. It is anticipated that these will generate increased income from levy.

R. Dredge had submitted a written request to WMOA to consider a contribution of £1000 to the GB Squad, in line with the proportioning of the surplus, i.e. £300 from WMOA and £100 from each club. Not all club reps were able to represent their committee views and not all of those who did were in favour of a contribution being taken from their 1/10 share of the surplus. D. Kingsbury was in favour of the proposal but felt that as the decision about the proportioning came from the JK organising committee, as a principle, WMOA shouldn't automatically override that decision but should seek a decision from each club to opt in or out. In particular the split also includes the Royal Signals who are not part of WMOA. All were in favour of the WMOA donating their 3/10 share.

EOC had submitted a request for a £500 contribution to support attendance of athletes at events under the wing of the EOC e.g. Home Internationals, particularly as a number of orienteers from the region do represent England. B. Elkington explained that the only funding route for EOC comes from the regions on a per capita basis.

This was discussed and it was considered whether an alternative might be to consider making contributions to senior athletes in the same way as for juniors. It was questioned whether the longevity of such a scheme could be sustained.

The committee voted in favour of making this contribution. Enquiries to be made for this to be presented at the CSC Final.

ACTIONS: I. Gamlen to approach all clubs to determine whether they would be in favour of supporting the GB Squad, as proposed, prior to distributing the surplus.

D. Kingsbury to write to BOF to urge them to match the WMOA contribution to the GB Squad pro rata.

9. Fixtures:

A. Williams reported that both the Forest and Urban Leagues were going well. The Hanley Urban event had been the last in the Urban League series, so the final standings will soon be established. Unfortunately the forthcoming HOC event at Titterstone Clee cannot take place as planned due to issues with permissions. Instead HOC are proposing an event on Highgate Common, but on 14 October rather than the date that had been reserved for Titterstone Clee. The change had not yet been advertised.

The WM Relays will be in Sutton Park. OD have circulated information to the clubs and Barry Elkington urged clubs to get this to the right people so that a good number of teams could be entered and make the event as competitive as possible.

The West Midlands Championships will be on The Ercall. R. Lewis to try and establish who the Planner is as the WMJS would like, if possible, to use the area for training after the event.

A. Williams is attending the National Fixtures meeting the day before the CSC Final and the Regional Fixtures meeting is scheduled for the following week to finalise the region's 2019 events.

R. Dredge had proposed a Biathlon event (orienteering and shooting) to run with the CSC Final. After feedback it had been felt this would best go alongside a multi-day event e.g. SinS and future JKs. RD was also seeking £1000 financial support to stage the shooting from WMOA.

From those who had tried this at JK2018 there was positive feedback that the shooting event had been fun and had helped to pass time whilst waiting for family members to finish competing. The consensus from the discussion about this was that it would be better suited to a multi-day event but the venue would need sufficient space to contain this safely. Organisers should be approached to determine feasibility and the WMOA committee were of the view that if it were to be included in an event the financing should be budgeted for from that event. The committee were not in favour of supporting it financially from WMOA funds as it is a one-off event and there is no pathway beyond for further participation.

10. West Midlander:

R. Postlethwaite apologised for having missed an issue earlier in the year but the latest West Midlander had been issued in August. The next copy is due November(ish), after the WMOA AGM minutes are available. It was observed by some that people are less likely to read and consult an electronic copy than a paper copy. The West Midlander is formatted such that it can be printed by recipients if preferred. Some clubs do still provide paper copies of their magazines to improve readership. Other mechanisms being used to try and keep members up to date is weekly/monthly news-sheets using applications such as Mail Chimp.

11. WMOA Website: There was no update from A. Johnson. He works away from home and is no longer able to attend meetings. I. Gamlen reported that the subscription for the WMOA domain had recently been paid.

ACTION: M. White to contact A. Johnson and see if he is prepared to continue updating the website beyond the AGM.

12. Development:

H. Morgan had run an Organiser's and Event Safety Course in July but the attendance had been disappointingly low with three participants on the Organiser's Course and four on the Event Safety Course. It was acknowledged that this was probably the wrong time of year for running such courses and timings will revert to Autumn and Spring when there has previously been a better response.

A Controller's Course is scheduled for 3 November 2018. There are three people registered at present, 2 from POTOC and 1 from OD. Details are to be circulated again and clubs are asked to encourage members to become controllers, who are much needed.

There was an application from Kristian Roberts (WCH) to be approved as a Level B Organiser. As per previous discussion elsewhere in these minutes, approval of officials for Level B events should be sought from the WMOA committee. However, Kristian mentioned the requirement in relation to his organising the CSC Final which is a Level A event. The British Orienteering website was checked and confirmed that for a Level B Organiser the requirement was to have run 2 Level C events and attended the Event Safety training course. For a Level A event Organiser this needed to be approved by the Event and Competitions committee. The committee supported Kristian's application provided he was able to demonstrate compliance with British Orienteering requirements.

ACTION: D. Kingsbury to write to Kristian and advise him of this.

13. Events and Competitions Committee:

There had been no meeting and there was no update. There are currently difficulties with rules changes as these have to go through the British Orienteering Board.

14. West Midlands Junior Squad:

A WMJS report was read out and appears separately on Page 9.

15. AGM Planning:

The AGM date has already been notified through the previous West Midlander.

There was a check of officers prepared to continue in post. The positions of Chairman and Secretary will be vacant after the AGM and volunteers are needed to fill these posts. A Webmaster is also sought.

I. Gamlen has approached Brian Laycock to audit the accounts prior to the AGM and this is in hand.

It had been believed that the WMOA policy for carrying whistles had been resolved at the previous meeting, but there had been some post-meeting correspondence that has put this back on the agenda. The proposal from the committee will be for discussion and final resolution at the AGM.

AGM Motions:

- 1) It is proposed that the WMOA event levy remains unchanged.
- 2) It is proposed that the cost of WMOA membership remains unchanged (currently free of charge).
- 3) It is proposed that the following policy about carrying whistles is adopted:

The requirement to carry whistles and/or cagoules should be evaluated for each event by the event Organiser and Controller based upon the terrain, participants and time of year and any other relevant circumstances. It is mandatory that the risk assessments will include this and record why they are/are not required. If the decision for an event is that whistles and cagoules are mandatory this must be policed - the Organiser and Controller are responsible for ensuring that a system for checking is in place.

The ongoing suitability of the data privacy policy is to be reviewed.

ACTIONS: Delia Kingsbury to circulate the AGM agenda to clubs.

I. Gamlen to prepare a budget for the forthcoming year.

I. Gamlen to explore collection of levy to see if there is a way of streamlining this, particularly in relation to the sums collected from the smaller events.

16. Club Round up:

COBOC: are starting up monthly events and taking their Maze 'O' to festivals and events.

HOC: The Titterstone Clee event is postponed as described earlier. There had been no Summer Evening Events this year which had been a big loss and it is hoped that weekend events will soon be established.

OD: have the usual Summer Evening Events and had run a Photo 'O' giving participants a Kenilworth map and 50 photos, with three hours to 'complete the course'. There is an emphasis to improve the social aspect of orienteering. With this in mind the plan is to try Score Events and mass starts this year with the aim to finish by 8pm for post-event socials. The example was given of Kenilworth Runners who put on food at a pub after the event and this has been very successful in increasing attendance. It was also observed that strict final details are not welcoming and 'no late entries' policies do not allow for flexibility. A 'Big Weekend' is planned for next year, 8-9 June, with 2 Sprint events around Warwick University and an Urban event in Coventry as a 'dry run' for the City Tour event in 2021.

POTOC: were running Urban Score training events on Wednesday evenings and do run Come and Try It events which attract 30-60 participants, ranging from novices, to experienced who also enjoy a run. There had been a successful Park Series this year and their next event is a new area - Berryfields.

WCH: have the usual Summer Evening Events, but these are WCH only due to access restrictions. The club is resting post-JK and the CSC Final is coming up. Obtaining permissions for events is proving difficult.

WRE: have just finished a successful Summer Series. Throughout August there had been Wednesday afternoon events at Attingham Park, promoted by National Trust, and 45 families attended one week. WRE are seeing these people moving on to further events and a training day is being put on to develop orienteering skills for those new to the sport. Plans for SinS are progressing and the events will be Brown Clee, The Ercall and Shrewsbury Urban.

17. AOB:

Richard Lewis noted that this was Delia Kingsbury's last meeting as Secretary and thanked her, on behalf of those present, for her efforts in this role over the last few years.

18. Next Meeting:

15 October AGM

10 December - next routine meeting.

One, to me, worrying trend is that the West Midland Relays have moved to the end of October. Last year, this year and next year have all chosen the last weekend of October to hold the event. Why I ask? The weather can be dreadful and the date is always part of half term. Surely it is a Summer event? So I ask can we go back to it being a Summer event again please?

As a regular orienteer I also feel that the number of events that are staged in the region has fallen. Hopefully now the JK is over we can remedy this in the future......at least until 2028 when the JK is expected to return to the region.

I would like to thank everybody who has been on the WMOA committee over the past three years for your time and effort, especially Delia who has kept me up-to-date, well informed and prompted me when required. I hope that you give the incoming Chairman as much support and back-up as you gave me. Thank you.

8. Treasurer's Report: Ian Gamlen.

Thank you to everyone who has supported me in my 2nd year as Treasurer. The WMOA financial position has improved significantly due to the very successful JK 2018 held in the

West Midlands. The WMOA share of the financial surplus from the JK was £19,738 - double what had been budgeted for. Following the closure of the 2017-18 WMOA accounts, this has now been shared out amongst the various West Midlands clubs using the agreed formula of 1/10 to each WM club (plus RSOC) and 3/10 being retained by the WMOA. The WMOA balance on 10/10/18 was £7649.08.

When the income from the JK 2018 is excluded, the WMOA's income (£2163.00) was slightly exceeded by its expenditure (£2369.00). It is anticipated that due to events such as SinS 2019, levy income in 2018-19 will be higher than in 2017-18 and that there is likely to be a surplus of income over expenditure.

Ian presented the WMOA 2017-18 income and expenditure summary. This has been audited by Brian Laycock (HOC) who has confirmed that they are a true and accurate summary of the accounts. This was duly accepted by all present. Thanks to Brian for kindly agreeing to audit these.

Budget for 2018/2019:

Motion 1: It is proposed that the structure for WMOA levies is changed to the following:

o - 40 adult participants: Free

Over 40 adult participants: £1.00 each

This is intended to save time processing levy payments whilst providing comparable income. With the current levy small amounts of money are raised from a large number of small events, this means more payments that Club Treasurers have to pay and more work for the WMOA. By increasing the number of participants before clubs pay the WMOA levy from 20 to 40, but increasing the levy to \pounds_1 per participant at events above 40 we will significantly reduce the number of events at which the levy has to be paid whilst still collecting a similar amount of levy.

This was unanimously supported by those present at the meeting.

Motion 2: It is proposed that the WMOA membership fee (currently free) for the forthcoming year is unchanged.

This was unanimously supported by those present at the meeting.

9. Fixtures:

Unfortunately, Allan Williams was unable to attend this evening. He did, however, inform Ray that everything regarding WMOA fixtures is fine and he is happy to continue as the WMOA Fixtures Secretary.

10. Other Reports:

WMJS Report: Mel Elkington and Kirsten Strain sent their apologies and sent the following brief report:

The ongoing progress of the Junior Squad have been regularly reported at the committee meetings. Thank you to Rod Postlethwaite for publishing our reports separately in the West Midlander. We would like to thank the West Midlands Orienteering Association for their continuing support.

13. WMOA Policy for Carrying Whistles for discussion and agreement:

The requirement to carry whistles and /or cagoules should be evaluated for each event, by the event Organiser and Controller, based upon the terrain, participants and time of year and any other relevant circumstances. It is mandatory that the risk assessments will include this and record why they are / are not required. If the decision for an event is that whistles and cagoules are mandatory this must be policed - the Organiser and Controller are responsible for ensuring that a system for checking is in place.

The above policy was unanimously agreed as above.

14. Any Other Business:

Bob Brandon is trying to get an up to date list of West Midlands Controllers. It was pointed out that Allan Williams, as Fixtures Secretary, should have access to this information via the British Orienteering website.

ACTION: Allan Williams to provide Bob Brandon with an up to date list.

Henry reminded everyone that there is a Training Day in the Lake District coming up shortly 10/11/18. He is running a Level C Controller's course on 03/11/18 if anyone is interested.

In the absence of a WMOA Secretary, Ian proposed that any WMOA correspondence should be sent to either himself as Treasurer or Richard Lewis, newly elected Chairman, until the post can be filled.

ACTION: Ian Gamlen to liaise with Andy Johnson regarding this.





A Pilgrim's Progress in Northern Spain

As a rule I like going on holiday and visiting strange and exotic places. Quite often I have suggested going away and Christine has replied that she is too busy and for me to go with friends or by myself so this time I did......but where to? After thinking about it, one place I have wanted to visit for a long time is Santiago de Compostela in North-West Spain. I am not sure why but I set about investigating the hows, the whys and the whens.

After a little bit of internet searching I found out about a Pilgrimage route to Santiago called the Camino. I then discovered there were several different routes: from France, Central Europe, Portugal and, obviously Spain. I chose to attempt the Camino del Norte as it was the most scenic, following the Northern coast so that in August it was a lot cooler than the rest of Spain and less populated than most of the other routes. The whole route is about 800km but, as I only had two weeks, I decided to walk from the start to Santander which is about 300km and then finish the walk next year.

I walked to Stafford station and caught a train to Manchester airport from where I flew to Bilbao. I then got a bus to San Sebastian and the local train to Irun, on the border with France, where the walk starts. A busy day but not quite finished. I found my lodgings and then went to the bridge from France where the walk starts and then to get my 'credencial' stamped. The 'credencial' is a passport, similar to the ancient YHA card where you collected stamps from hostels that you had stayed in. It enables Pilgrims to stay overnight in dedicated hostels while walking the Camino so that at the end of the walk, with a card full of stamps, you can claim a certificate from the Archbishopric in Santiago.

After a nights sleep I set off to walk to San Sebastian. Day 1 is the hilliest day on the entire route with a big climb to start with and another big climb half way after a ferry ride across a river at Pesajes de San Juan. Today had good views and a lot of forest. Towards the end of the day the vista suddenly opens out and a great view is had of the whole of San Sebastian, a lovely town with two great beaches and fine buildings. As I had not yet fully 'connected' with the Camino I had prebooked a bed at the YHA. I did look at the hostel connected with the route and decided that I would stay in one from now on. This turned out to be a fortuitous choice as overnight and all the next morning it poured with rain. Had I stayed in the Camino hostel I would have left at 8am as it closes then but, luckily, I booked another night where I was and 'wimped out' of walking in the rain.....a good choice.

After six days walking over 153km I made it into Bilbao. This was a bit of an error as I had meant to stop before it and then walk through town the next day but I missed the sign to the hostel and by the time I realised it was a way behind me (2.5km roughly) so I kept going. On the way to Bilbao I had stopped in Guernica - the town immortalised in a painting by Picasso after the destruction caused by German bombers in 1937 at the behest of the Nationalists during the Spanish Civil War, and several beach towns full of holiday makers. On this stretch it was Fiesta time in San Sebastian on the Friday and in Deba on Sunday. They had street music, dancing, fireworks and a lot of drinking. In Deba they also had a bull fight that I went to - not an activity I would recommend. In the first fight the bull had the matador on the floor drawing blood but, alas, allowed itself to be distracted and moved off to chase shadows. In Bilbao it was Fiesta week with a huge number of people and bars so, again, a lucky occurrence stopping here. When I left the next morning at 7am lots of young people had been up partying all night.

It took another five days to walk the 140km to Santander where there is a ferry ride into town from Somo giving great views of the town and is much easier on the feet. This was not quite the end of my walk as the next stage is very long with a short train ride across a river after 15km so the next day I walked out of Santander to Boo de Pielagos from where you catch the train to Mogro. Next year I will catch the train from Santander to Mogro and have a shorter walk than most people on this stage. At Boo I caught the train back to Santander.

All told I walked 306.3km in 12 days with an average of 25km a day. The longest day was 32.9km and the shortest 14.4km on the way to Boo. As I have a step counter I took 490,500 steps at an average of 40,000 a day. One day I saw a wild boar and twelve eagles soaring overhead while in a fairly wild area. The average temperature was about 30° C but sometimes reached about 35° C.

An average day consisted of: up at 6am, start walking about 7am, stop once or twice for food, drink or a view and arrive at a hostel between 1 and 2pm. These usually opened at 3pm and had a variety of queueing systems from: take a number, put your name on a list or just line rucksacks up in arrival order by the door. Once in the hostel: have a shower, wash the clothes and then go for a walk to the beach or around town. In the evening I usually went out for a meal with a group of fellow walkers. This was 3 courses with bread and unlimited wine for about 10 \pounds , a bargain. Lights out in the hostel at 10pm except in Bilbao where the fireworks started at 10pm sounding like WW3!

The most I paid for a bed was $19 \in$ in a real hostel but most of those on the Camino asked for a 'donation' - they expected $5 \in$ as the 'donation'. Some included breakfast, bread and jam, but most did not. A couple of hostels charged $10 \in$ but this included dinner. I stopped in two nunneries but missed the monastery as it was another 8km to walk that day. Most had a small kitchen and/ or a microwave so I could make a cup of tea and they all had a washing machine.

I took three T shirts and pants, two pairs of socks and shorts, a pair of trousers, a thin windproof cagoule that doubled as a jumper and two ponchos as a rain proof layer. My plan was to use the ponchos and discard them as they got wet but, after avoiding day 2, it only rained once more so I brought one home. I walked in a pair of trail shoes and changed into my sandals at the hostel. My one 'luxury' was a inflatable pillow as those provided were flat and too low. I also took lots of tea bags and Nescafe 3-in-1 (coffee, milk and sugar) for drinking and lots of rice crispy biscuits for nibbles. My rucksack weighed in at 6.4kg but slowly became lighter as I ate, drank or used the contents. Next year I will not take the trousers but add my swimming trunks.

I met lots of great people from all over the world some of whom were doing a second or third Camino. Early on I met a mother (60ish) and daughter (35ish) who had walked from Amsterdam but they were beaten in the distance race by a honeymooning couple from Poland. They had married and then set out the next day, 28 April, and had walked 4500km up to 26 August where I met them in Santander and had 500km to go. I had many conversations with a Norwegian man who was walking with his son about many old British Comedies. He loved Fawlty Towers and Only Fools and Horses in particular. Few people were walking for religious reasons most were just on a walking holiday.

The eldest person I met was about 78 and a lot were students on holiday. The common language was English, in fact all conversations started in English and quite often one had to ask where people came from to realise they were not English. Young Swiss and Germans speak fantastic English. A man from Iceland seemed to speak every language there is including Basque, a language that even the Spanish had no clue about while a Swiss girl was practising her Spanish to go with her fluent German, French, Romansch, Italian and English. About ¹/₃ of Pilgrims were Spanish and ¹/₃ German while the remainder came from all over the world. I only met two other English people on the Camino one of whom, Brian from Manchester, was the 78 year old.

After I had finished I spent a quiet day in Santander, which is a very nice town, visiting the Royal Palace gardens and then got the bus to Bilbao where I visited the Guggenheim Museum where I spent over three hours in an art gallery which is an unbelievable feat for me. Well worth the senior $9 \in$ fee. After that I had lunch and then went to the airport and flew home to be greeted at Manchester airport by Christine and younger son Andrew.

CompassSport Cup/Trophy 2018 Final



The Final of the CompassSport Cup/ Trophy took place on 21 October at Haywood Warren on Cannock Chase hosted by WCH.

On the 19 August I travelled from Heathrow to Gothenburg for 9 days as a part of the Gothenburg JROS tour. The tour is aimed at M and W 18/20's. It is designed as a 'self-help' tour and athletes attending are expected to plan their own training and cook their own meals. When I arrived in Gothenburg Mark Saunders took me and two others to the Savedalens AIK club hut which was quite nice with showers and a sauna. The next day we took the bus to another local area to do some morning training and in the afternoon we came back to the club to join in with Tuesday night training which this week was O intervals, where you are in a small group and there are around 3 or 4 'gaffled' controls and a meet up point at the end and then another few controls etc. I was in a group with Jura Macmillan, Lucy Tonge, Bethany Kippin and Mark Saunders. Jura won most of the parts but I won two of them. Back at the hut the local club members had cooked for the evening and provided lots of cake which I was in need of after the intervals.

On Wednesday we did training that Joe Wright and Felix Wilson had planned the day before. It was a mixed tech course that comprised of a line course, control pick, corridor and donuts. I found this quite tough considering it was in a tricky and quite grotty area. At one point I had caught up with 3 other guys that were stuck and we tried to climb up a crag however I was too small and Noah Howlett had to pull me up it! When we got back to the hut we all went swimming in the lake right outside the hut, it was a lot colder than last year for swimming so it wasn't long until we all went into the sauna to warm up.

Thursday was our rest day so all of the girls decided to catch the bus into Gothenburg to do some shopping, relaxing and explore the city. It was a really nice day and I enjoyed looking around the city. We bought a face mask to use before date night as a tradition and some love heart candles. Later on we did some sprint training around the city. It was a 2.6k course with 22 controls. I liked the sprint as it was quite difficult but fast.

Friday the girls had to plan something so we went for a clock relay so we didn't have to put any controls out and we could all take part as well. This was the evening that me and Jura had to cook. I am not a very experienced cook so we went for something easy - vegetable korma with rice and a crumble for dessert. The korma ended up more like a casserole instead but it still had good reviews from everyone eating it.

On Saturday we took part in a one man relay at Utbynäs which was two legs adding up to 3.5km. It was a mass start 'gaffled' relay in one of my favourite areas with a really nice runnable forest and a few technical parts. I made few mistakes and felt good about my run. After the relays we went back to the hut and Lachlan set up a Micro O using a map he created of the club hut, inside and out. Lachlan put out the pin controls and there was a 10 second gap between everyone starting which meant that there was a fight to use the controls. By the end everyone apart from Harrison and Ryan Elliot mis-punched and got disqualified. Date night was this evening so we used our face mask and lit the love heart candles. The boys got the tables ready splitting them up so it was a couple per table and putting wine glasses, flowers and candles on each table along with name places. As there were only 5 girls some of the boys had to go with each other. Harrison and Sasha were put together as they acted like a married couple anyway. I was with Joe Wright again and Mark was with Alisdair Pedley.

Sunday was race day which I was looking forward to and nervous as this is what the training was for. When we came home it was pizza night so we all went out to a local pizzeria, I had a huge ham and cheese pizza and it was a nice time to talk to everyone. I have really bonded with all the girls and made lots of new friends that I didn't think I would talk to before and have had an amazing experience learning new things whether it was cooking or orienteering.

I had a great time there and now miss it lots! I'm extremely glad and thankful that Mark Saunders organised the tour and that I could go.

Finally, thank you to POTOC and the WMOA for donating the money which allowed me to go, I really enjoyed it!

While I have no definitive cause for this, I think from the MERCS file that one of the downloads had an inconsistent time perhaps caused by the handling of daylight saving which added an hour to some downloads and then meant the next competitor returned before they started. Relays are all treated as a timed start, so clock inconsistency is always a problem. I could not fix this in MERCS, and re-downloading just made things worse, so you can see what I have done, largely using the download reports for the competitors. I would note that there were no 'EMIT errors' for any competitor other than the failure of control 125 which was handled on the day and through the backup cards."

So a big thanks go to Dave and Graham for all their hard work. The issues with the results have rather overshadowed the brilliant courses planned by Duncan Birtwistle ably controlled by Robert Vickers (HOC). A big thanks to those two as well. *(first published in 'The Droober')*.
